<sup>1</sup> Each week, you will keep your eyes and ears open for new Words, in the readings, on the radio or TV, in other courses, wherever. When you hear a Word you don't know, or don't know very well, or find interesting for some reason, write it down in your Word Diary and look it up. If you can't find it in your dictionary, go to the library, or go online to look it up. Write down its definition, and, just like in grade school, make up a sentence using the word. (If it's interesting, you might also write down where you saw or heard it). You need to find two new words each week (although more is also fine, less is not). On Mondays, you will give your Word Diaries to Bob, who will check off your two words and give you a percentage point. We'll do that for the 15 weeks of term, making 15 percentage points in all.

<sup>2</sup> Each student will be responsible for at least one official Question. When you hand in your Word Diary to Bob each week, two or three of you will be required to also hand in a Question each, in some way related to the course material. Bob will answer these Questions (if there is a reasonable answer) in the Friday sessional. Banned from Official Questionhood: "What is the etymology of X?"

<sup>3</sup> That is: attendance! You're docked 1 per cent for every class you miss, with 3 free: if you miss 3 classes, you get the full 10%; if you miss 13, you get 0%.
